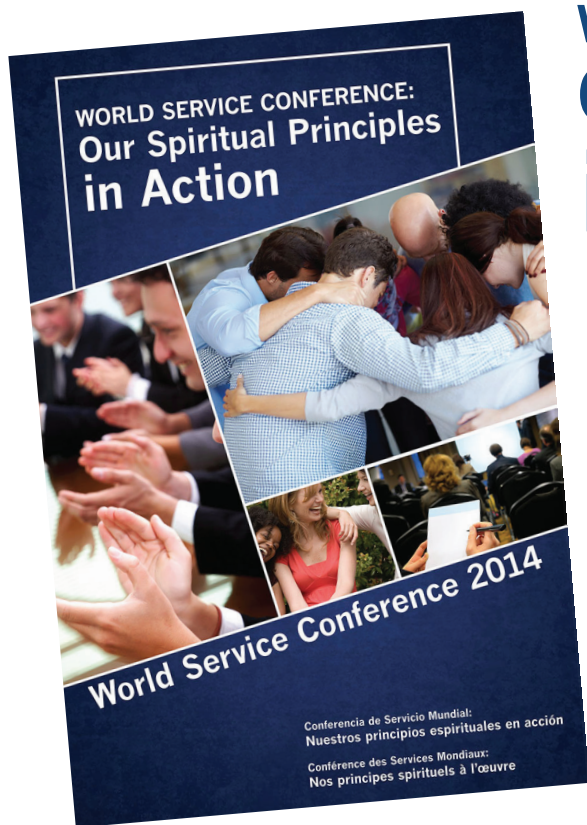

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WORLD SERVICE CONFERENCE: Our Spiritual Principles in Action

Before the creation of Al-Anon, the wives of A.A. members began to gather to support their husbands' recovery. I imagine these ladies chatting about their gardens, the activities of their children, and sharing recipes giving them the ability to enjoy the moment and some mental rest from the fear and worry we all have experienced due to alcoholism.

Soon their conversations would lead to mutual feelings of an over-developed sense of responsibility and realizing others tried similar tricks to stop the drinking and their sense of isolation would diminish. They would find comfort in discussing some common concerns such as, anger and hopelessness, giving some relief realizing they were not crazy. They were already practicing Al-Anon's primary purpose to help those affected by someone else's drinking through sharing their experiences and showing each other unconditional love and acceptance.

Eventually they decided to practice the Twelve Steps themselves for their own spiritual growth and as these family groups continued to meet, they came to believe their recovery could be strengthened by uniting together as Al-Anon Family Groups. This practical expression of goodwill would bring hope and recovery worldwide to those affected by this disease in small towns, big cities, for our neighbors, friends, and those yet to come.

The 54th World Service Conference will convene this April in Virginia Beach, Virginia. Conference members gather together, bound by love and trust in each other and a Higher Power, to work toward a shared goal of growth and unity for the fellowship as its primary concern as it has been for every Conference before us.

Groups have given the Conference permission to deliberate on important matters, to give guidance, and to guard our Traditions. They have recognized that the Conference is the voice of worldwide Al-Anon; its largest group conscience and have carefully chosen service representatives to speak and act for them. This is the spiritual principle of delegated authority in action. By becoming volunteers, Conference members have assumed a tremendous responsibility for our world services accompanied by an equal amount of authority and accountability.

Members are responsible by getting enough rest, coming to Conference each morning prepared for the day mentally

and spiritually, and following Conference rules such as one time at the microphone per topic and turning off cell phones. There is also the responsibility of creating a culture of trust in a way that brings out the best thinking and attitude of everyone. This means we respect others by listening; showing courtesy, and participating in discussions by expressing our views, putting aside personal desires and opening ourselves to the will of our Higher Power.

When Delegates arrive at Conference, they have the authority to vote as their conscience dictates, not necessarily as instructed by their Areas. When listening to others share, there may be other matters we did not consider or know of before Conference and sometimes new information is presented that affects the way members choose to vote.

This authority encourages the Conference to explore every option, to consider every change, and be fearless about Al-Anon's future making sure our message of hope is clear to everyone who walks into a meeting. The Conference may pass resolutions, make recommendations to the WSO, and on overall policy matters the Conference makes final traditional decisions. This authority guarantees our world services shall continue to carry on under all conditions.

The Conference is accountable to the fellowship by planning for tomorrow—having vision to see possibilities before they become obvious. Bill W. said “We must think about our service needs as they relate to general economic conditions, group capability, and willingness to contribute. We often must try to think months and years ahead.” (See page 202 of the *2014-2017 Al-Anon/Alateen Service Manual* [P-24/27].) Delegates are accountable to their Areas by reporting back discussions and actions of the WSC and how they stretched their mind to such an extent it will never be the same again.

We hope all Al-Anon members will think about their spiritual journey after hearing their Area Delegate's report and reading the *2014 World Service Conference Summary* (P-46, available in August 2014) and sharing what they have learned with others.

Our AWSC Inventory

One of the highlights of the Fall 2013 Area World Service Committee meeting was our AWSC Panel 52 Inventory. Some of the inventory questions were derived from pages 154-155 of the *2010-2013 Al-Anon/Alateen Service Manual* [Editor's note: pages 162-163 of the 2014/2017 edition]. Some of the questions were group inventory questions, and some were personal inventory questions. Our Area Chairperson facilitated the inventory and compiled the results.

A few comments are listed below that summarize areas in which AWSC members felt that there was room for improvement.

Service Manual questions

Some members felt that we could improve:

- Informing/unifying the groups in the Area
- Supporting the Newsletter Editor by suggesting items of interest for the Area newsletter

Group inventory questions

Some members felt that we, as an Area, could improve:

- Providing better interchange of information about service activities
- Sticking to the topic

Personal inventory questions

Some members felt that they, as members of the AWSC, could improve by:

- Sharing the *World Service Conference Summary* with other members of their groups and districts
- Being willing to be part of a thought or task force
- Refraining from interrupting or carrying on a side conversation during the AWSC meeting

Taking care of myself during Al-Anon Service

Doing Al-Anon service work is recommended to all members as a way to progress in the program and to give back with gratitude what has been freely given to us. Service is certainly important and many Al-Anon members express that they get back more than they give. It is important, however, to remember to practice good self-care when doing service. This is particularly important when the service work will extend over several hours or days, such as attending the Area Assembly or in providing sponsorship to another member.

We can delegate specific tasks and share responsibilities.

The Al-Anon slogan, "Let it Begin with Me," can remind us that our first responsibility should be to make sure that we take care of our own needs. When doing service work, the basics need some attention. These basics include eating well, exercising, doing daily readings, getting enough rest, and staying hydrated. Any health issues need to be considered and accounted for. If we approach service work as a martyr, without taking care of these needs, we are not practicing Al-Anon principles and our service work will not help us progress in our program and will ultimately lead to burn out.

It is also helpful to remember that it is okay to ask for reimbursement for travel to attend the Area Assembly and that is an expected group or district expense. If you are representing your group or district, it is their responsibility to take care of these expenses.

While we are encouraged to say "yes" to Al-Anon service work, that is only a suggestion and it is always important to think about the particular service work we are considering

is good for our program as well as the fellowship. It is good to do service work that is outside our comfort zone, but we should not feel compelled to do service work that we do not like or find terrifying. There will be other service opportunities if we have to say no to something.

Another way to practice self-care is to remember that service work can be fun and to find ways to incorporate fun into service when traveling to the Area Assembly, working at a public outreach booth, or when sponsoring another member. Spending time with friends in the fellowship or focusing on getting to know interesting new people can help. When service is not fun, we can look at whether our own attitudes are preventing us from appreciating the fun that is available or whether some other type of service may suit us better.

I have been impressed over time when members have stepped down from service work in order to attend to more pressing needs. This reminds me that our own program needs to come first. No one in Al-Anon seems to judge someone when this happens. No specific member is indispensable and all are valued.

An additional way to practice self-care in service is to remember that we never have to do it alone. We can always ask for help from others who have been in similar positions of service before us. We can delegate specific tasks and share responsibilities. We can always ask our Higher Power for guidance. Finally, it is helpful and important to have a Service Sponsor who know us and can help us find fun and self-affirming ways to approach service.

Approaching Al-Anon service work in a healthy way can allow us to experience some of the rich benefits of service without the self-sacrifice we have sometimes practiced in our relationships before Al-Anon. This allows us to persist in giving back what we have been freely given.

Thoughts from our Area Chair on “Alateen is Al-Anon”

Alateen is Al-Anon. We all hear this said, but do we really understand what it means? I understand it to mean that Alateen is part of Al-Anon, that it's the same program; the only difference is the age of the members. “Al-Anon Family Groups” is inclusive of all members of a family of an alcoholic. Younger people feel the same things adults feel and should not be denied help because of age. Alateens are the future of Al-Anon, and don't we want our program around for those we love who haven't yet discovered it?

To me, “Alateen is Al-Anon” also means that if a teen comes to an Al-Anon meeting, they should be welcomed as we welcome all members of Al-Anon. A younger member can be encouraged to try an Alateen meeting if one is available nearby, but should never be turned away. Tradition Three states, “The only requirement for membership is that there be a problem of alcoholism in a relative or friend.” Tradition Five tells us that “Our groups have but one purpose, to help families of alcoholics.” Neither Tradition specifies age.

As members of Al-Anon Family Groups, we need to think about what we, as individuals, can do to welcome and give comfort to younger family members of alcoholics. In our Area, there are only nine active Alateen meetings. As an Area, we need to discuss what we can do to make Alateen, “Al-Anon.” As individuals, we can reach out to Alateen Group Sponsors and support them. As districts, we can invite the Alateens to district meetings and gatherings. We can think about Public Outreach as it relates to the teen who has been affected by someone's drinking. Have you ever heard an Alateen member share? They share the same things that are shared in Al-Anon meetings. They share from the heart, say how they feel, and mean what they say. They too have been affected by someone's drinking and are suffering. We hope you will start the discussion in your group about “Alateen is Al-Anon.”

Group Records Coordinator's Report

All the Al-Anon Information Services (AISs or Intergroups) have agreed that each meeting needs to be registered with World Service Office (WSO) prior to being listed in the local directory. This may have something to do with the fact that over forty-two new meetings have been registered this year!

The registration of groups with the WSO provides numerous benefits to the group. Upon registration, new groups receive a series of three group packets. The first packet includes the *Al-Anon and Alateen Groups at Work* booklet (P-24), and a variety of leaflets, pamphlets, and service tools. A second mailing that includes the *current Al-Anon/Alateen Service Manual* (P-24/27) and additional information is sent about six months later. The third and last mailing is sent around the group's first anniversary with specific information about growing groups' issues.

A complimentary copy of the current *Al-Anon/Alateen Service Manual* (P-24/27) is sent to all the registered groups when the revised version is released. The on-line version of the *Service Manual* available on the Members' Web site at www.al-anon.org/members contains the latest information between printings.

Al-Anon and Alateen groups in U.S., Canada, Puerto Rico, and Bermuda also receive a monthly complimentary copy of *The Forum* magazine and the *Group e-News*, the WSO electronic newsletter. The newsletter contains time-sensitive information, links to newly-posted service tools, and other resources available on the Members' Web site.

Registered Al-Anon groups have their meeting information provided on the WSO toll-free meeting line "on demand" 24/7. As of May 2013, callers have the option to use the automated phone system to locate an Al-Anon meeting or to speak to an operator during business hours for specific meeting information. Averages of 2,000 calls are received monthly on the automated phone system, in addition to the calls received by the phone operators.

The Al-Anon group registration process with the WSO is expedited when the new group information is submitted on the WSO On-line Group Records application by the Area Group Records Coordinators; the group is no longer required to submit multiple forms to the Area and the WSO.

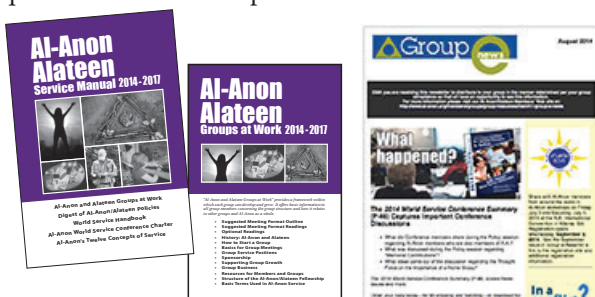

At our district meetings, we are studying the Traditions the first hour of our meeting and it is going really well. We're getting a lot of participation from our Group Representatives.

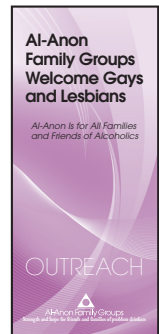
Sharing our diversity

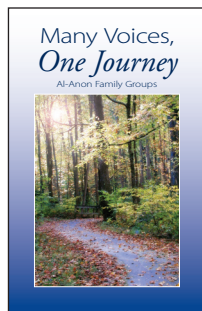


Conducting a literature workshop

Our district focused on the often cited statistic that every alcoholic affects at least four people. We felt that our eight Al-Anon meetings in two counties should be larger. To change the four to one ratio, each group was asked to have one member volunteer to be on a Newcomer Committee. In three months, we:

- Delivered *Al-Anon Faces Alcoholism* magazines to shelters, drop-in centers, hospitals, doctors' offices, churches, and addiction service agencies.
- Explained Al-Anon to all ministerial associations.
- Met with and provided literature to Children's Aid Societies.
- Established communication with the Health Department's high school counselors.
- Approached all local newspapers to request space for meeting information.
- Encouraged local TV and radio stations to air Al-Anon's public service announcements.

This Committee worked hard, and we continue to pray for positive results. The Committee still exists and we are developing other projects. There definitely is productive energy when a group of this size works together for a common goal.

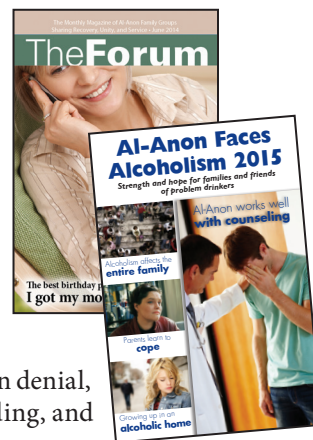
The Forum and Al-Anon Faces Alcoholism: Two very different purposes!

Many of us had to overcome multiple challenges before we were ready to give Al-Anon Family Groups a try. We had to overcome denial that there was a problem with a loved one's drinking. Some of us didn't want to ask for help because it was embarrassing and we didn't want anyone to know what was going on at home. Even if we were aware that Al-Anon existed, perhaps the misconception that it's a religious group kept us away. Still others believed that no one could possibly understand what they were going through.

Al-Anon Faces Alcoholism is designed to address those challenges. Members write about their own denial, or share how they overcame the fear of reaching out. Most of all, members share hope, understanding, and compassion with the potential newcomer.

In *The Forum*, members share how the Twelve Steps, Traditions, and Concepts of Service have helped them find—and keep recovery! Even the newcomer walking through the door for the first time, someone who has already overcome the challenges of reaching out for help, could benefit from reading the experience, strength, and hope that we share in *The Forum*. They may be confused by our Legacies and even the some of the language we use, but Al-Anon and Alateen members will be there to help. Imagine how daunting it could be for a *potential* member, someone who may have never even heard of Al-Anon, to read about Concept Three or Tradition Five for example.

With that in mind, please encourage members and groups in your Area to share *The Forum* with one another, and share *Al-Anon Faces Alcoholism* with their community!



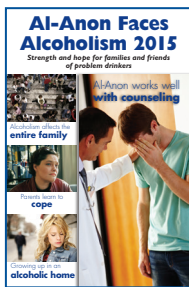
The Forum

Our Public Outreach Committee gave all the Al-Anon groups in our District copies of the *Al-Anon Faces Alcoholism* magazine. Members were encouraged to leave a copy of *AFA* along with a meeting list in a public place of their choice for a potential Al-Anon member to find.

The district also provides *AFA* magazines, pamphlets, and meeting lists to a mental health and addictions facility. We order and keep a supply of extra copies of the *AFA* public outreach magazine to place in the waiting room and give to social workers, as needed.

A list of places receiving the magazines and meeting lists was collected by the Public Outreach Committee. Many groups have experience an increased number of newcomers attending their meetings in recent months.

Al-Anon electronic literature has arrived

The WSO still receives calls and e-mails asking when we will publish Conference Approved Literature in electronic format. For those who haven't heard, the *Having Had a Spiritual Awakening* e-book (eB-25) and the *How Al-Anon Works* audiobook (eA-22, in MP3 format) are available through your electronic media provider.

An e-book version of *How Al-Anon Works* (eB-22) is available in English, French, and Spanish, but due to a combination of business and technology issues, it is only available from the Apple iTunes store at this time, for use on Apple computers and iPhones. This e-book may be available through other vendors at a later date.

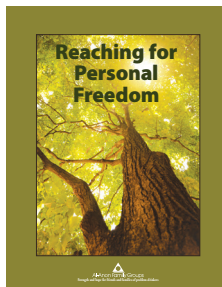

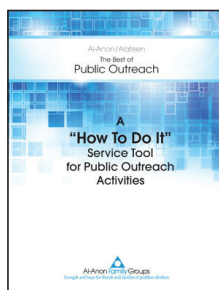

A Beginners Meeting flourishes after PSA campaign

The Eugene AIS took advantage of matching money from the Oregon Area to run the Al-Anon PSAs in the Regal Cinemas theaters during the 2012 holiday season. The PSAs ran for about six weeks, in every theater, before every movie, and were viewed by thousands.

It is difficult to put a measurement on the results but there was one very clear positive impact. District 6 has one Beginners Meeting on Saturday morning. Attendance at this meeting was clearly up, sometimes 20 to 25 people attending the 30-minute meeting before going in to the regular meeting. In addition, the Saturday meeting purchased several cases of the softcover *How Al-Anon Works* (B-32) book to meet the demand of newcomers at the Beginners Meeting.

These shared experiences, sent from around the world, came to the WSO through Spanish newsletters as well as correspondence. The WSO will continue to select service activities for these pages, so Spanish members will have the opportunity to write and read about their service projects without translation. This additional page gives all members a consistent reminder that service in Al-Anon is taking place in many languages.
